

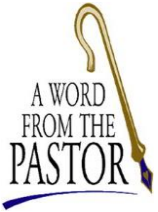

THE GIFT OF TECHNOLOGY

Among all the great content in this newsletter I especially recommend Gene Blischen's article entitled "Post Covid Tendencies". It offers some interesting reflections on our life since the pandemic hit and raises some excellent questions about the future, especially as it relates to our relationship with technology.

The influence of technology has certainly been one of the dominant aspects of our life together over the past year. How many times have you found yourself saying, either to others or just to yourself, "Thank goodness for technology" as you log onto a Zoom Bible study or settle into watch a church service on your couch in your PJ's on YouTube? And how many of us would have even dreamed a year ago that we'd be navigating cyber-space as adroitly as we've learned to?

Here at the church we have just had live-streaming equipment installed. That means that we now have a camera mounted in the sanctuary that will allow us to broadcast services live over the internet. Once our techies are trained up we will all be able to "go to church" virtually together at the same time on Sunday morning again (and still record the service to watch later too).

Will this and other technology we have been adopting change how we worship? How we gather for fellowship or learning? Will it allow a greater diversity of voices to be heard in our discussions and decision-making? Will it shape the way we engage our mission? All question yet to be answered.

However, the gift of new technology is nothing new to us as Lutherans. I think of Martin Luther himself who took advantage of the latest technology in his day, the printing press, to advance his Reformation. In fact, I've heard it said that without the printing press the Reformation would have remained a local movement that would have died with his passing. But because of Luther's embrace of its new possibilities he was able to change the world.

Yes technology has its pitfalls. Not every innovation is beneficial. And we need to beware of being seduced by sheer novelty. But if it's one thing I'm learning as a self-confessed technophobe, it's to keep my eyes open to the strange and wonderful ways God's Spirit works through strange and wonderful things in this world. And to try to discern the gift in what at first glance might make us suspicious.

The season of Lent, which starts soon, is often thought of as a journey towards renewal. Maybe this year that path will hold some unique and fruitful discoveries.

Entering the Season

As we move from the Season of Epiphany, and enter the season of Lent followed by Easter, we bring your attention to the following key dates. As before, during this time of Covid planning services continues to be a challenge. However, the following is the schedule we anticipate following at this time. Wednesday, February 17th:

ASH WEDNESDAY

We will begin our journey through Lent towards Easter with a joint Ash Wednesday Evening Service with Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and Trinity Lutheran church. This service will be streamed live at 7 pm and will be available to view on Trinity's [YouTube channel](#).

You may choose to attend the study or the service, or both, as you so choose.

PASSION / PALM SUNDAY

MAUNDY THURSDAY / GOOD FRIDAY

We will be offering our services for these two days, either live streamed or pre-recorded. Details to follow.

We will be offering an Easter Sunday Service. Our hope is to offer this live with Holy Communion. At the very least we will be providing a pre-recorded service and Holy Communion offered live over Zoom. Details to follow.

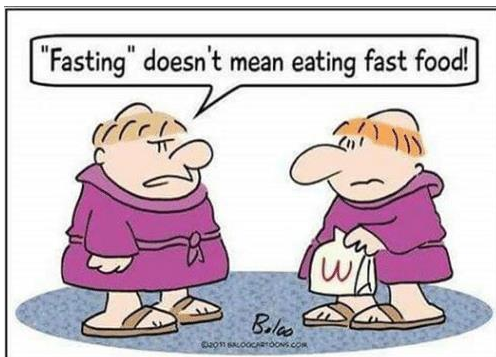

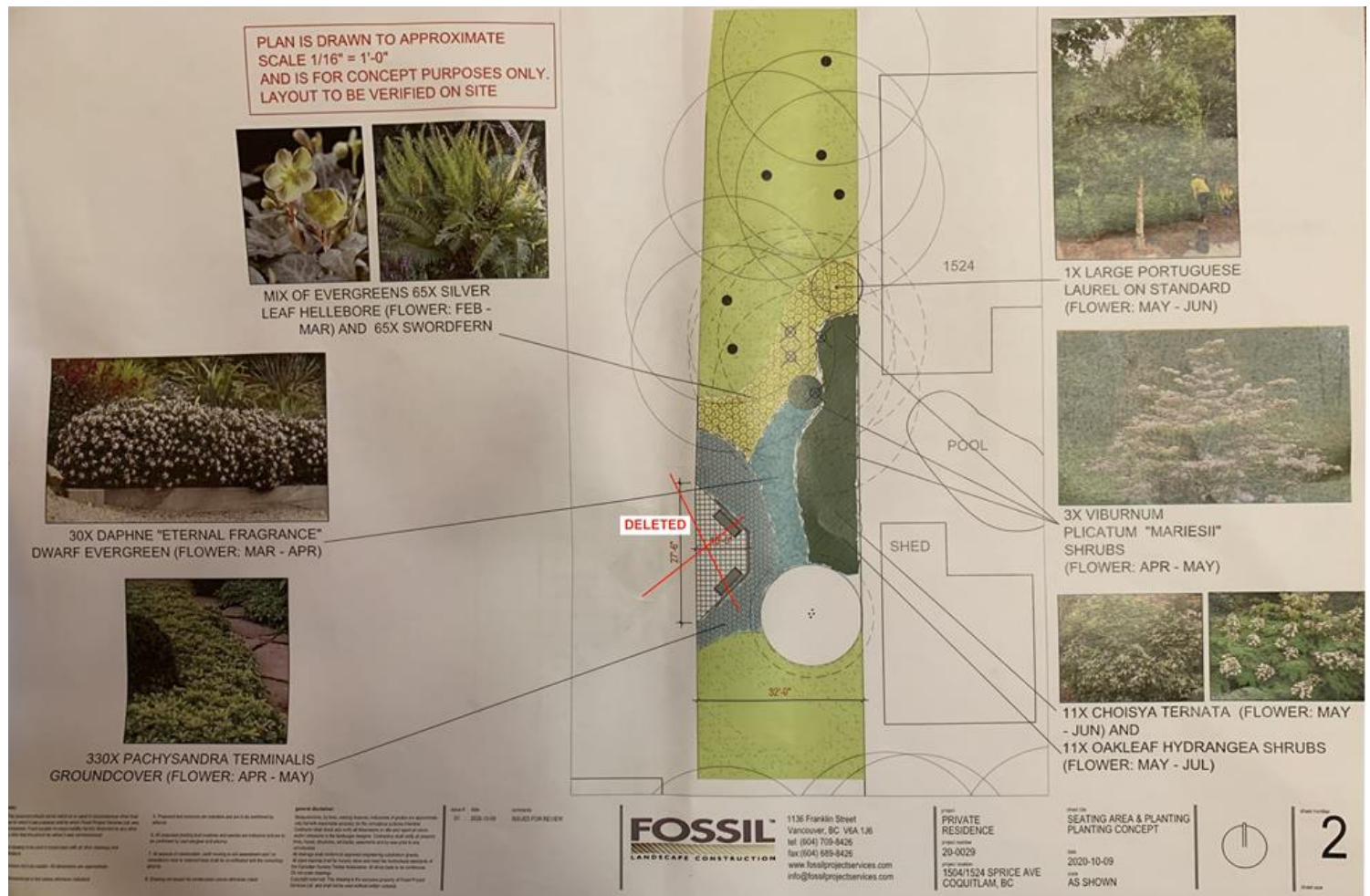
East Side Landscape Proposal

Our neighbours Blair & Cathy Wilson, who live on the east side of our parking lot at 1524 Spruce Street, have made a proposal to our Church. This concerns the land that is between Spruce Avenue, the back alley, our parking lot and their fenced property. They are prepared to install plants, flowering bushes, and trees, as well as a sprinkling system. They will also care for this garden for as long as they are the owners of 1524 Spruce Avenue. They will be responsible for all costs related to establishing and maintaining this garden.

The Wilsons have supplied an architectural drawing for the proposed garden, which is shown below.

The one drawback to the proposal that council could see was that 3 trees would be cut down. The trees are all cedars and have been marked with paint to identify them. One tree has been topped, one tree is small and diseased, and one tree is in good health. Should we agree to this proposal, the neighbours will ensure that an arborist oversees the removal of these trees to limit damage to other tree root systems.

Your Church Council unanimously agreed that Good Shepherd Church should accept this proposal, and this will be discussed further at our Congregational Annual Meeting on February 28th hoping to receive full congregational approval. Our Church will have a beautiful garden established with no costs to the Church.



REFLECTIONS...from our Student Pastor

Greetings!

Here's something you need to know about me – I love books. That's a good thing, considering the amount of reading I need to do for school... But I try to find time to read other things as well.

In the last while, I have been reading through a pile of books on racism and its impact on people. My pile includes stories on the experiences of people from various backgrounds. Some were written in the U.S. where the context is slightly different; others are Canadian and speaking about issues in our society.

As a white person I know very little about racism first-hand – but as someone who is married to a person of colour, I know racism is real. It will continue to be real until we as a country, as a society, are willing to acknowledge its existence and start doing something about it.

We are approaching the season of Lent, a season traditionally dedicated to self-examination, reflection, and repentance. When Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the Wittenberg Castle Church door, his first thesis reminded readers that Jesus calls “the entire life of believers to be one of repentance”.

When it comes to racism and issues of race, I believe we white people in North America have some self-examining and repenting to do. I want to invite you to join me for a Lenten study on Wednesday nights, starting February 24th, to discuss issues of race and racism, seeking God's guidance and grace. All are invited, no matter what your ethnic background. (I promise that if you are a person of colour and want to join the conversation, you are not expected to share more than you are comfortable with.)

God created us all equal. It is time for us to figure out how to live out God's will.

Post COVID Tendencies

Since the recent release of the BC vaccine schedule our minds have been given the luxury of thinking what does the future hold without COVID. This event has abruptly changed our church life. It is a change in our physical world and we have used technical tools to dampen the effects of isolation. As we prepare to hopefully come out of this, what have we learnt? Has anything changed our views of the world and the culture we inhabit? How has this COVID episode affected our community and our individual faith? What church and community processes will be maintained and what will we default back to?

Current habits always shape the way we have done things. COVID left us **alone** in ways we had never experienced before. Has that “**aleness**” contributed to a time and space for greater reflection? Has it brought forward questions of spiritual concerns? Has our identity as Lutherans changed when we have not been able to gather as a community on a regular basis?

Changing back (post COVID) to something else will be another time of upheaval. It will also be a time of choice. Those choices will have a different consideration based on what we have recently experienced. Suddenly we were quickly forced into living in a digital culture. We have seen how the technology has become connective and collaborative in a fashion we did not realize. We have had to learn new tools to do the same jobs as before. We have begun to experience the start of some cultural transformation. We have entered into something new, something we are still getting used to. It has facilitated connection in a very quick fashion. It has helped us collaborate with the ease of meeting together. What has it meant to tell God’s story in this different digital culture?

Ryan Panzer in his book *Grace and Gigabytes* states it this way: “They (a digital culture) facilitates constant and meaningful connection. They move us toward greater collaboration. And they ignite our creativity.”

We have arrived at a different place in the life of our church. Grace abounds. We can benefit from this past COVID experience by not completely defaulting to the previous norm. We can continue to leverage the benefits we have realized and see the church boldly meet the call that we have been given.

New Vocational Training Program to Help More Women Get Specialized Jobs in Palestinian Territories



Lutheran World Relief, in partnership with Lutheran World Federation Jerusalem, has begun a \$10 million program to improve education, training and employment for Palestinian women in non-traditional fields. The new program called GRIT (Gender-Responsive and Inclusive Technical and Vocational Education and Training), will give women better access to technical and vocational training programs suited to their specific needs, helping them get jobs and gain financial independence. By expanding existing vocational training programs and introducing new courses for women in a variety of fields, GRIT aims to normalize women's involvement in diverse roles within their communities.

A Story...from our Ignyte Youth Group



“We can do no great things, only small things with great love.” – Mother Teresa

I love this reminder of the unspeakable importance of small kindnesses – a smile, a hug, or an encouraging word. But what does that sort of love look like in a pandemic, when we so rarely see each other in the first place? For ignYte, the shared youth ministry of St. Laurence Anglican and Good Shepherd Lutheran in Coquitlam, BC, it looked like decorating paper bags.

Through a growing partnership with another local Anglican church, St. Stephen's, we learned about the Wednesday Lunch Club. The Club is a food ministry supporting people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. In ordinary times, people would gather twice a month for a meal and community at St. Stephen's, but the pandemic made that impossible. As they attempted to continue supporting the Lunch Club community, its organizers planned to distribute Christmas gift bags full of foodstuffs and other items.

And that's where ignYte came in. One of the Lunch Club organizers, Esther Hizsa, had recently joined our youth discernment group, a small team of adults who help listen and provide support to what's happening in the youth ministry. She suggested that our youth could decorate these gift bags as one way of living our vision to help youth “share God's love in every part of their lives”. My co-leader Rachel Genge and I loved the idea!

We wanted to gather in person, but then, in November, our restrictions tightened up. We had to change plans...again. We distributed the bags from St. Laurence one Saturday afternoon, then invited the youth to join us for an online makers' party the following evening, where we would decorate the bags together.

The evening itself was delightful. We drew and designed while chatting about classes and solving riddles with elaborately renamed Christmas songs. We talked about the challenges of the year. For all that had threatened to pull us apart, here we were – an unlikely community of youth and adults brought together by a shared faith, simply enjoying each other and this opportunity to do a small thing with great love.

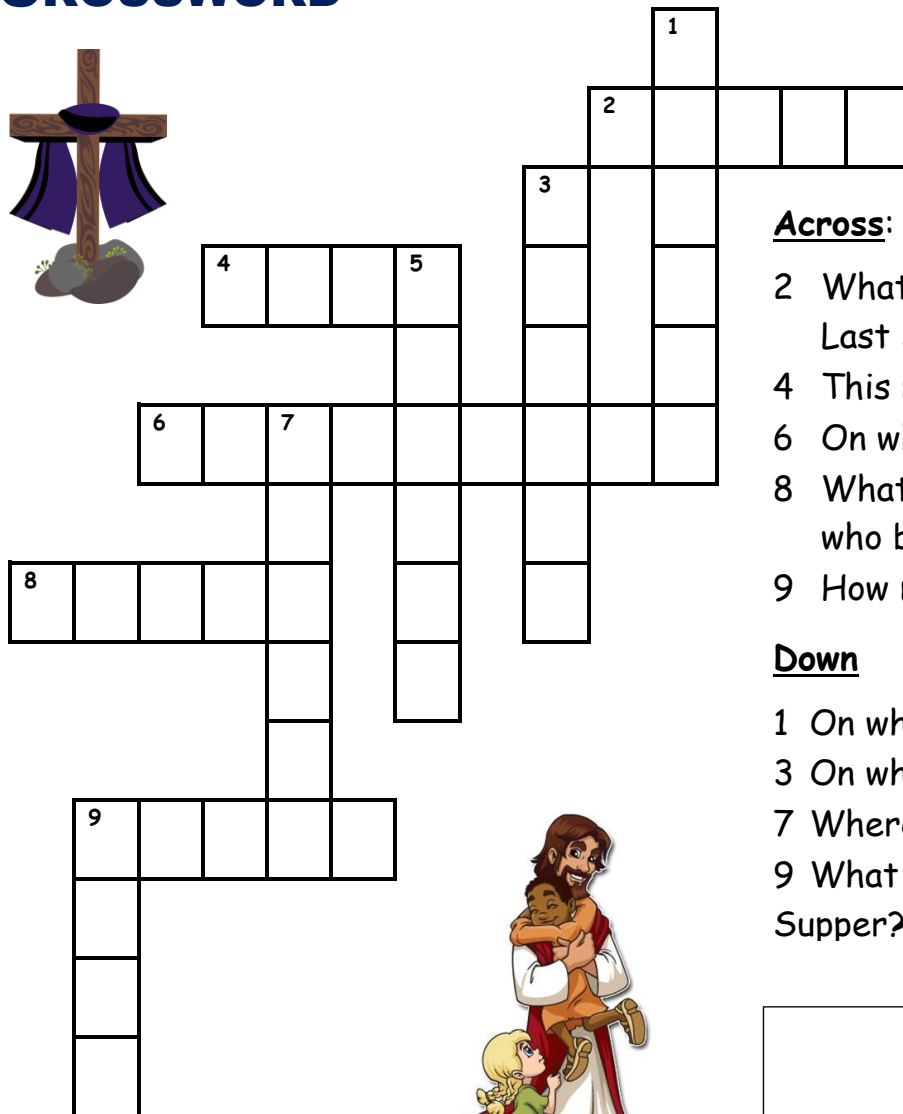


Once Esther collected the bags, they were filled to the brim with other physical expressions of love, including socks, gloves, toques, razor, chocolate, toiletries, gift cards, home-baked cookies, and Christmas cards. As she and other Lunch Club volunteers dropped off the bags, they shared moments of celebration and sadness with people in the Lunch Club

community, and a number of folks were touched and thrilled by the care and creativity the youth had shown. One person even said she would cut out the bag artwork and put it on her fridge!
