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VISIONING QUESTIONS

vision: 1. The faculty or state of being able to see

2. The ability to think about or plan the future with imagination or wisdom

"Vision" is one of those words that is easy to use and difficult to define. And so I am grateful for the editors of dictionaries for their skill in articulating the meanings of such words.

The first definition stated above is probably the one that comes first to mind for most of us. But it's the second definition that expresses the sense we intend when we speak about our congregational visioning process. This is indeed a process of thinking about the future. And there's rarely been a more opportune time for that.

So often when we think about planning for the future we think about how we can perpetuate what we've done before, or even return to what once was. But the pandemic has disrupted that temptation. We know things will never be exactly as they were before. So how can we take advantage of that and be a little more open-ended in our thinking and planning?

Which leads to the next part of the definition above, that is, to think about the future "with imagination or wisdom." Actually, I think that should be "imagination **and** wisdom." Using our imagination is not always something we're good at as church people. Maybe to some of us it even sounds a little dangerous.

But that's exactly what Jesus was doing in his parables. He wasn't simply teaching us tidy and moralistic little life lessons. He was painting pictures of a kingdom that blew open people's imaginations. A kingdom that included those no one ever thought belonged. A kingdom that covered more territory than anyone ever realized. A kingdom that brought together those who no one believed would or should have anything to do with each other. And a kingdom where God is revealed in unexpected people and places and activities. A kingdom where the wisdom of God turned the logic of human thinking on its head.

So what kind of future can we imagine for our congregation, remembering that God's imagination is surprising and challenging and creative? And will we allow God's wisdom to guide the process, remembering that God's wisdom often challenges our long-held assumptions and cherished ways of thinking?

May these questions set the stage for our journey ahead.

Live Streaming Audio-Video

Worship Services

Now that were are getting more comfortable and proficient at using our new life-streaming audio-video equipment, we will be switching from pre-recorded services to regularly live-streaming our weekly Worship Services with Holy Communion at 10:30 am. Even though we strive to be prompt and begin on time, we do appreciate your patience in the event we run into any snags along the way. Just to let you know, if you tune in late to a live-streamed video, you can always put your cursor on the time bar at the bottom of your screen and rewind it to 0:00 minutes and watch it from the beginning. You can access our services by going to our YouTube channel (Good Shepherd Lutheran Church of Coquitlam) and clicking on the video that's identified as "live." There will be a recording of the service on our channel as well at some point after the live streams ends.

Provincial Health Orders and guidelines remain in place preventing gatherings of more than 10% of our capacity (15 people). As a result, church gatherings will be postponed until church council provides us with direction to go ahead and safely return to gathering.



Our Easter morning gospel reminds us that it wasn't all that jubilant for the disciples either. There was grief, and there was confusion when the tomb was empty. They would only understand it all later on.

Maybe we will also understand more later on, when the pandemic is behind us and we know how things have changed. But for now, we just continue to trust in God's goodness. And we trust that the empty tomb is a source of life for us as well.

And as we trust, we can also ask questions about what God is calling us into. We are about to engage in a visioning process that will hopefully guide us as a congregation into a better understanding of what God might have in mind for us.

Because God is alive and active in the world – the empty tomb reminds us about that. God is alive, outside the church building walls – the pandemic restrictions have shown us that. While we haven't been able to gather, we have still continued to be the church.

What could our future look like in God's mission, joining in God's activity in our community? We don't yet know, but hopefully we'll find out when we ask these questions together.

And then something completely different... The weather is improving, and that means more chances to be outdoors. I would love to meet you all in person, if possible – maybe for a walk, or outside on your yard or deck, or the church parking lot. This depends on the pandemic situation, of course, and the restrictions we face – no meetings until April 19th at least... Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada National Bishop Susan Johnson

This month is a return to an interview with our ELCIC National Bishop Susan Johnson. There is a connection with Coquitlam here as she did work for our school district as a music teacher at Port Moody Senior and George Pearkes Junior. Elected in 2007 she has been our Bishop for 14 years and resides in Winnipeg, Manitoba and works out of the national office there. Her dad was a pastor at Gloria Dei in North Vancouver and one would think that would influence her call to the ministry, but there were many in her family that were ministers; her Dad's brother, her mom's father, 2 uncles and others who were missionaries. The family did shape her to a point of her being scared about a call into the "family business" but then God got loud and she left teaching.

Her most memorable experience as a Bishop was in 2017 at the THE TWELFTH ASSEMBLY OF THE LUTHERAN WORLD FEDERATION held in Windhoek, Namibia to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation at a global level. It was an incredible honour for her to preside at the Eucharist with so many other Lutherans from around the world. You can see the Namibian newscast of the event at here.

For the next generation of Lutherans in Canada the pandemic has changed her view. She has seen a resilience and flexibility now and hope for the future. This is moving us to a deeper sense of mission and an understanding of spiritual renewal.

Her favourite author is Robertson Davies and she is currently reading The Mirror and the Light by Hilary Mantel, the third in her series on Thomas Cromwell. With literature she describes herself as having a selective interest in history.

When asked if she had any closing thoughts there was a quick 'no'. She, as well as the rest of us, are pandemic-ed out. Our Bishop has a sense of humour and humbleness that is remarkable. Her leadership over the years has brought a renewed sense of purpose and understanding to Canadian Lutherans. We are blessed to have her.

Keep a careful watch over yourselves and over the church. The Holy Spirit has made you its leaders. Feed and care for the church of God. He bought it with His own blood."

The Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth gathering is happening this year on August 20-22, and we're hoping you can join us!

What is CLAY?

The Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth Gathering (CLAY) is a program of the <u>Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC)</u> and the Anglican Church of Canada (ACC).

Canadian Lutheran Youth Gatherings have a history that goes back as far as 1966. In 2010, the gathering became a joint gathering of the ELCIC and ACC. CLAY is an immersive, several-day event where youth gather from across the country to worship, play, learn, and grow together.

Who can participate?

CLAY is designed for youth **ages 14-19** (born between 2002 and 2007). But since CLAY 2020 was postponed, youth up to age 20 (born 2001) are welcome to participate. Youth born prior to 2001 are still welcome to attend and are invited to do so as a **Leader in Training**.

With the endorsement of their Home Team Leader and their local congregation/parish, and with the permission of the CLAY Registrar, youth who will be 13 years old (born in 2008) by the end of the year may be permitted to attend the gathering.

What will CLAY look like this year?

You can expect about 3 hours of online group gathering time each day featuring: worship, workshops, and a large group gathering with the CLAY band, drama team, and our keynote speaker, **Melanie Delva**.

There will also be Late Night Spots every day (a CLAY participant favourite), activities engaging with our **National Youth Project** happening outside of the online gathering times, and local activities planned for these three days.

As home team leaders, Rachel and I committed to making this as engaging an experience as possible. As much as it is safe to do so, our aim is to spend these few days together in-person, following any public health guidelines necessary.

How much will it cost?

The national organizers are making this a pay-as-you-can event, suggesting a **donation of \$45**. Depending on what we are able to do by then, locally planned activities by Rachel and I may increase this cost somewhat. But we'll make sure to let you know as we make plans. Just know that we don't want money to prevent anyone from coming!



The following is a full article submitted to Canada Lutheran Magazine penned by some members of the weekly Prayer Group. It has been accepted for publication in the July August edition of the Canada Lutheran magazine but it will be edited significantly.

We thought you might enjoy reading the entire article as submitted...

Journey of a Prayer Group

"There are as many ways to pray as there are souls who walk the earth." Brown (2003)

A small number of people from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church (GSLC) of Coquitlam took a journey together that began with the God-inspired idea of forming a prayer group, and the adventure was launched. The direction of the journey has evolved, but the compass point for the travelers has remained constant: to share a deeper communion with God in prayer together. The route has been guided by internal member preferences, external circumstances, and listening to God's spirit. By being open to exploration, to the voice of God, and listening to each other, the group remains focused on communal prayer. This is their story.

Inspiration for the Journey:

Three women from GSLC began praying together while they were serving on a committee that met several times per year. They consistently began meetings with prayer, and when they had difficult topics they would stop and pray again, asking for God's guidance. They realized that the practice of praying was natural and wonderful, and it made their work lighter. As they prayed, they recognized the importance of communal prayer. When the time came that some were no longer to be serving on that committee, they remained resolute in their desire to continue praying together.

Making the Trip Plan:

As the women discussed forming a prayer group, an opportunity presented itself. Dr. Faith Nostbakken of the Lay Academy offered an online learning opportunity in November, 2018, on the topic of prayer. The women attended and discovered that they were not alone in the desire to pray together regularly with others.

In consultation with Pastor Eric Krushel and another church elder, they discussed some fundamentals for the focus of the group. Three guiding principles were key at the outset. They believed that each meeting should start and end in prayer that asked God's wisdom and teaching, and closed by thanking God. Secondly, scripture would guide the prayer practices or activities, and lastly, that they would experiment with a wide range of prayer practices.

With those guidelines, they scheduled a bi-weekly prayer time and invited members of the congregation to join them. They chose as a guiding resource to begin the journey, *Pathways to Prayer*. Brown, (2003).

Beginning the Journey:

The group journey first began in early 2019, with nine people. Leadership of each session was voluntary and rotated within the membership each week. Members started by finding their individual preference of prayer type(s) among experiential, relational, innovative, and searching prayer. They expanded their experimentation with prayer into a variety of practices including; centering, contemplative, and meditative prayer.

The route they travelled included: learning about praying The Lord's Prayer, praying the Scriptures (Lectio Divina), writing prayer journals, and praying with icons. The group continued their voyage and created home prayer altars, and members experimented by taking an Emmaus Walk with a partner. They learned about unfamiliar prayer traditions that included using prayer beads, the prayer shawl, and praying in tongues to enrich communion with God. What resulted from 'testing out' new prayer practices were lively discussions and opportunities to pray and explore together. Through these shared times of seeking a more intimate relationship with God in prayer, they deepened their friendships and Christian walk together.

Expanding the Journey:

As group members travelled the pathways of communal prayer, their learning, practicing, and individual engagement increased. While Pastor Eric had always been a member of this group they resisted the temptation to put him in charge, and continued to share the leadership roles and responsibilities. The group remained a shared laity-led prayer group with the privilege of a very knowledgeable member in their midst.

The scope of their journey then broadened and one member led them in a study of The Angelus painting by seventeenth century Jean- Francois Millet. What lively discussion and learning they enjoyed as they discussed the images in the painting! The painting, two peasants at sundown, having worked in the fields all day, suddenly stilling their tools to be locked in pious prayer at the sound of the church bell, at the appointed time thrice daily. How different the world would be, they imagined, if that prayer practice had continued to this very day.

Their journey took them on exploration of Rembrandt's huge and only seascape, Christ in the Storm on the Sea of Galilee, and discussed it from all angles, including the rich symbolism, the choices Rembrandt took in this masterpiece, including colour, and shadow, and even placing himself in the boat with Christ, and of course the Scripture story from Mark 4 itself.

Group members completed exploring what they wanted to of Brown (2003), with the exception of a Labyrinth Prayer, which needed to be set aside due to inclement weather. They decided to continue coming together, now weekly, and developed a schedule alternating between Prayer Conversations and Lectio Divina or other prayer explorations.

The "Prayer Conversations" were used to look at interesting theological topics, including elements and prayers contained in the Lutheran Book of Worship, and even a sampling of Aboriginal Prayers. They spent time examining A Franciscan Blessing, and explored comments on prayer by Karl Barth.

During the Lectio Divina prayer times, a volunteer led them in selected scripture readings and explored what God might be saying or teaching them.

External Influences:

In October, 2019, one member pointed out that National Bishop Susan Johnson challenged member churches to join her and focus on a year of Prayer. This was an encouraging message and, rising to the challenge, the group continued to explore and expand their focus on prayer.

The prayer group journey was further inspired by the request from the ELCIC for Christians and people of different faiths worldwide to pray together on the same day in the midst of the spread of COVID-19. Members chose a monthly prayer-worthy concept and invited the entire congregation to pray with them on that specific focus in their own

prayer practices, on the second Wednesday of each month. So far, focused prayer concerns have been for peace, respect, courage, creation, trust, remembrance, hope, gratitude, healing, and repentance, as the spirit led them.

The prayer journey continued, and COVID-19 required the change from face-to-face meetings at a church to on-line gathering over Zoom. At the same time, members decided that it was important to continue to gather weekly. COVID-19 changed the world and there was much to pray about.

Current trip co-ordinates:

At this point, some members continue to gather weekly, with a change of focus every second week. At the time of writing, we have settled into a practice where a volunteer leads the group in a Lectio Divina prayer meeting one week, and the following week, a spontaneous "Community Prayer Group", that is less formal and more organic, meets to pray whatever the Lord brings to their hearts and minds on that day. Membership fluctuates weekly and remains flexible. All sessions end with approximately twenty to thirty minutes devoted to an open communal prayer. Members don't know where this journey will take them next. From the beginning of this journey they asked for God to guide and lead them, and teach them ways to deepen their prayers and connection with God. As a result, the group loosened up its 'where to next' mindset and remained open to listening to the Spirit's gentle leading. Maybe post-COVID the group will be able to gather together for further experimentation and experience the labyrinth prayer after all.

Lessons Learned While Travelling:

Group members have spoken about the value of our prayer group. These are some of their words. "Each Prayer Practice that we looked at opened my eyes to God's personal invitation to meet God in prayer. I'm grateful to the heart of this group--as I see God's presence there. I am blessed by these meetings and by my brothers and sisters who join me on this journey of prayer."

"Being in the prayer group has brought me closer into the presence of God. My loneliness and sense of isolation diminish greatly and I am strengthened in my faith." "I do feel blessed to be in and among this prayer group. I have learned how to better pray out loud and have realized that we are all more alike than different. One's fears are replaced with love and acceptance from the group."

"We were seeking God and found God in our midst. I feel blessed and understand that our time together is a gift from God. We come as individuals and join as the body of Christ, no one more important than the other. All of us come to learn and share the teachings of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and they are there before we arrive, with us as we pray, and ahead of us as we leave the group. What a wonderful gift."

The End of Our Discussion but not the End of Our Journey:

Speaking for the group, we thought you might enjoy reading about our little group of "pray-ers" and their journey into a closer relationship with God. May God use this to inspire you, too, to be curious and seek out your own journey of intimate prayer with our Gracious Lord. We have learned that all prayer, as a foundation for spiritual life, leads to a deeper knowledge of God who is present with us and in all creation. Prayer is the raising of one's heart and mind to God. Hallelujah!
