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BACK TO ???

This September newsletter is the one where I usually write about getting back to our normal fall routine: back to worship, and all those activities we normally enjoy and look forward to after a refreshing summer break.

Well, this year, for obvious reasons, is a little different. Yes, we are looking forward to returning to in-person worship (I'm writing this the week before Labour Day). But how it will all roll out and what things will look like by Christmas is anyone's guess. "Getting back" is hard to talk about when you're not sure exactly what you are getting back to.

So how to name a time like this? Well, we might want to consider the word "liminal". Liminal or liminality is a word describing a threshold time; an in between time; a time where you know one way of being has passed, but a new one has not yet taken shape or come into view. And that can be an uncomfortable experience. Most of us like predictability and knowing what to expect in the future. Liminal times, however are full of uncertainty, discomfort, unpredictability.

But liminal times can also be exciting and inspiring. They can free us up to try things that have never been tried or let our creative juices flow in ways we've perhaps never allowed them to flow. It makes me think of our visioning process (which is something we definitely will be getting back to). Visioning is an exercise for liminal times as we acknowledge the gifts of the past but also open our minds and spirits to the possibilities of the future. It's challenging but worthwhile work.

Maybe we think that we're unique in facing times like these. But not so. In fact, the Bible is full of stories of God's people facing liminal times. As Susan Beaumont (our synod convention guest speaker) even says, "God's greatest work occurs in liminal space." Think of the Exodus story where the Hebrews wandered for 40 years in the wilderness. They knew they weren't slaves anymore, but they also didn't know what they were becoming. They vacillated between wanting to return to Egypt and hoping for a new future. Eventually God led them to the promised land. They became Israelites.

They sometimes couldn't see it, they often forgot it, but God was with them even in their anxiety and disorientation. And God is with us in this time as well. No we don't know how this fall will roll out. We don't know what our visioning process will yield. What we do know is that God is faithful, will never abandon us, and just might be up to God's greatest work among us even now.

Welcome Back!

We are pleased to be able to offer in-person, weekly worship services again at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. They commence on September 12th, 2021 with the Health Order Guidelines in place at the time. We anticipate those will include masks-wearing, social distancing, and ventilation (all windows open so dress accordingly!) As our Public Health Orders are updated, our gathering guidelines will be subject to amendment as well. We ask for your continue consideration since we all have different Covid risk tolerance levels. The entire service will be projected, and our live-stream worship service will still be accessible and recorded for same day uploading and access.



Lutheran World Federation 2021 Season of Creation September 1 – October 4



In the following years, other Christian World Communions endorsed this initiative, and today many churches in the ecumenical family observe the "Season of Creation" (also known as Creation Time) between September 1st and October 4th, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, as observed by some Western traditions.

A Home for All?

Renewing the Oikos of God



For our Lutheran communion, this liturgical season of prayer and action has become an opportunity to affirm the LWF's commitment to address a central crisis of our time—climate change. Echoing our governing body decisions since 1977, the Twelfth LWF Assembly affirmed "that the global ecological crisis, including climate change is, human-induced. It is a spiritual matter. As people of faith, we are called to live in right relationship with creation and not exhaust it."

Honoring this commitment, the LWF invites its member churches worldwide to join in the annual "Season of Creation". This year we will be uniting around the theme, "A home for All? Renewing the Oikos of God." Oikos is the Greek word for "home," or "household." By rooting our theme in the concept of oikos, we celebrate the integral web of relationships that sustain the wellbeing of the Earth. We hope that this

Season of Creation renews our baptismal call to care and sustain this ecological turning so that life may flourish, and all creatures may find their place to flourish in our common home.

A Home for All? Renewing the oikos of God is an invitation to engage in a month of prayer, symbolic acts and campaigns to give thanks for creation and renew our human vocation to care for it. It is also an opportunity to be united in our human vocation to reshape just and sustainable political, social and economic systems that respect the lifegiving ecological limits of the Earth.

This year's ecumenical prayer, printed below, centers the voices of Indigenous Christians from around the world. Throughout this Season of Creation, we are encouraged to come back to this beautiful prayer.

Creator of All,

We are grateful that from your communion of love you created our planet to be a home for all. By your Holy Wisdom you made the Earth to bring forth a diversity of living beings that filled the soil, water and air. Each part of creation praises you in their being, and cares for one another from our place in the web of life.

With the Psalmist, we sing your praise that in your house "even the sparrow finds a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young." We remember that you call human beings to keep your garden in ways that honor the dignity of each creature and conserve their place in the abundance of life on Earth.

But we know that our will to power pushes the planet beyond her limits. Our consumption is out of harmony and rhythm with Earth's capacity to heal herself. Habitats are left barren or lost. Species are lost and systems fail. Where reefs and burrows, mountaintops and ocean deeps once teemed with life and relationships, wet and dry deserts lie empty, as if uncreated. Human families are displaced by insecurity and conflict, migrating in search of peace. Animals flee fires, deforestation and famine, wandering in search of a new place to find a home to lay their young and live.

In this Season of Creation, we pray that the breath of your creative Word would move our hearts, as in the waters of our birth and baptism. Give us faith to follow Christ to our just place in the beloved community. Enlighten us with the grace to respond to your covenant and call to care for our common home. In our tilling and keeping, gladden our hearts to know that we participate with your Holy Spirit to renew the face of your Earth, and safeguard a home for all.

In the name of the One who came to proclaim good news to all creation, Jesus Christ.

LOCAL CHURCH GLOBAL V CARE Expanding our View

What is Environmental Racism?

We are currently celebrating the Season of Creation, which consists of the five Sundays between September 5 and October 3 (inclusive). It's a season that focuses our attention on our created world and our call to be good stewards of all God has made. God has given the gift of our planet as a home for all. But our environmental practices often contradict that truth, treating some people as if this is more our home than theirs. That's environmental racism, which consists of actions such as the following:

- Hazardous facilities disproportionally affect Indigenous, Black, and other marginalized communities.
- Heavily polluting industries tend to be located very close to these communities, affecting air and water quality.
- There is often a lack of political power to fight against the policies that allow harmful projects to be placed in these communities.
- There is a slow rate of clean up of contaminates and pollutants in racialized communities.

Example: PICTOU COUNTY, NOVA SCOTIA

A'sek was a tidal estuary used by the Pictou Landing First Nations as a place to hunt, fish, dig for clams, as well as a place to pray, and was considered to be the "other room" of their community.

In 1960 a pulp mill was proposed at Abercrombie Point and the government proposed A'sek, now known as Boat Harbour, to be used as a waste treatment plant. The pulp mill opened in 1967 and millions of waste water daily was piped to the harbour. By 1968, the Pictou First Nations were complaining about the pollution from the effluent plant, the sulphur smells, the fish die offs and health concerns. Demands were made to clean up Boat Harbour.

Governments promised and promises were broken and the complaints went on for years. The final straw for the First Nations happened in 2014 when a pipe carrying effluent burst, spilling 47 million litres of untreated effluent over wet lands and a sacred Mi'kma burial ground. The pipe was blockaded and clean up demanded. A deal with the government was made, but it still took until April of 2020 for the last discharge to be made into Boat Harbour.

Today Boat Harbour is a toxic place containing mercury, dioxins, furans and cadmium. Plans are now underway to start a clean up, which may take up to ten years to complete, but at least the air is cleaner and there is a glimmer of hope for the Pictou Landing First Nations.

As we continue to celebrate the Season of Creation, may stories like these help us to find ways to truly make this world a home for all.

A Summer Update from ..



CLWR's Summer 2021 Report shows that because we and others responded quickly and generously to their urgent requests for those in need, CLWR and their partners on the ground were able to do the following in Christ love:

- India: As the 2nd wave of COVID-19 hit this country, we provided cash support, awareness/sensitization on COVID and hygiene kits to 45,000 people in 9,000 households
- **Myanmar**: successfully rebuild 29 longhouses, each able to shelter 8 families, with 21 more in the process of being repaired. While the work has slowed due to pandemic restrictions, CLWR has worked to ensure these shelters are safe, especially for women and girls.
- **Burundi**: working with 900 households in 10 villages, we continue to provide immediate food support as well as training farmers, supplying seeds and agricultural tools, setting up village savings and loan groups and supporting the rehabilitation of community resources through cash-for-work initiatives. In Burundi, CLWR's goal is creating longer term solutions to build resilience
- **Lebanon**: Where many in this region are struggling to make ends meet, CLWR's partner *Norwegian Church Aid* has been providing hot meals to vulnerable families three times a week. This work of supporting basic nutritional needs has proven to be life-saving. Educational fees have also been paid on behalf of many of the country's impoverished children.

And it made us that much more excited for next year's CLAY in Waterloo, Ontario, themed around "Ashes & Embers".

We particularly want to find ways to deepen our relationships with each other, connect with other groups from our supporting churches, start singing together again, and explore how we can join God in mission in the community and wider world. Is socially-distancing causing you to miss human engagement and face-to-face contact? Are you aware that most weeks the church offers the following online get-togethers over Zoom that offer just that? You are invited to join in any one (or all) of these live-over-Zoom events. All are welcome!

Sunday mornings at 9 am -Bible Study over Zoom

We are planning to resume our Sunday morning Bible Study on September 19th at 9 am. To begin with we will continue to meet online through Zoom. Our hope is to transition to a hybrid format soon so keep your eyes and ears open.

If you have never attended this study please know that all are invited. It doesn't matter if you are a beginner with the bible or an experienced reader. Everyone's voice is respected and our discussions are always lively. We usually focus our study on the gospel reading for that Sunday morning, but once a month we follow the ELCIC Bible Book Club selection. Our next Bible Book Club Sunday will be announced soon.

Sunday Morning Worship

Starting September 12th we will be gathering worship in person again **at 10:30 am**. Our protocols and procedures for the next while will be published shortly by email and sent to those who require it by snail mail. As mentioned earlier in this newsletter, we are requesting that only fully vaccinated people attend at this time. However, this service will continue to be live streamed over our YouTube Channel, and a recording of the service posted to our channel at shortly after the service ends.

Wednesday afternoons at 1 pm - Zoom Prayer Gathering

Our prayer gatherings (alternating between praying Lectio Divina style & free-style 'Prayers of the People') will continue during June and July, but will take a break during the month of August.
