The Journey In and the Journey Out

We've been discussing the Book of Revelation in our Sunday morning Bible Study lately. The perfect text for an Advent study!

Lutheran Bible Scholar Barbara Rossing describes reading Revelation as "a journey in and a journey out." As we follow the visionary journey of John of Patmos (the author) we are drawn up to heaven and into the very courts of God. We glimpse the glorious existence awaiting the faithful and behold God's suffering and sacrificial love that powers the whole universe.

But having been drawn in, we are then led back out. We learn that God doesn't wish to remain aloof from this creation. God makes God's home among mortals in that beautiful final picture of the new Jerusalem "coming down out of heaven." We too come back home to earth. But now with new eyes to see earthly realities from God's point of view. A point of view marked by hope, healing, and community.

As I think about it, the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany are also a kind of journey in and a journey out. Advent draws us in closer and closer to God's plan for salvation. Week by week the wreath fills with light. Finally the miracle is revealed. We see God in God's most intimate form, a naked infant in a manger.

But we aren't left there. We are led out of Christmas into the light of Epiphany. And there we begin to see the most ordinary things of this life as shining with the miraculous presence of God's grace and mercy. Where water can become wine, an ordinary fishing trip can produce an historic catch, and the poor, the hungry, and the grieving are called blessed.

In each of these seasons we receive a gift and a call. In Advent it's time to slow down and listen for the voice of God whispering the promise of hope into our lives. In Christmas it's the gift of Jesus and the call to rejoice. And in Epiphany it's the gift of new eyesight and the call to share the news of God's transforming love.

Maybe our visioning process is also a journey in and a journey out. A journey inward to reflect on who we have been and who God has created and gifted us to be. A journey to discover the gift of the new future God has in store for us. And a journey outward into the world to be the unique community we are.

That's a lot of journeying! Let us be on our way.



CONGREGATIONAL NEWS

In-Person Worship Evolving

As you are all aware, we currently gather every Sunday morning at 10:30 am for our weekly worship service with Holy Communion. If you wish to attend the service in-person, you are asked to pre-register by calling or emailing the church office the week prior. For the health of all we are respectfully requesting that attendees remain fully masked and that only fully vaccinated people attend these services at this time. These services also continue to be live-streamed over our YouTube Channel at 10:30 am, and a recording of each of our services is posted shortly after the service ends for viewing when convenient for you.

Good Shepherd's Reopening Team and council met a few weeks ago and discussed the next steps in our reopening process, and we have asked you all for your input as we plan further. If you missed this email notification, a brief summary is provided below. Please note that this meeting occurred prior to the awareness of omicron on the horizon. This variant may impact any reopening process that council may consider in the near future.

RECAP OF EMAIL REQUESTING YOUR INPUT:

With our current system, worship attendance is limited to approximately 50 people with attendees getting an assigned seat. While this plan has been working until now, we're wondering about making adjustments.

One proposal is to follow the Public Health guidelines for other venues, which is to require a proof of vaccination in order to enter the building. This would allow us to lift the restrictions on the number of people in worship, and to end the pre-registration and seat assignments. Continuing to remain fully masked while indoors would continue for the safety of all.

So, we request your feedback on the following: Would you feel comfortable showing proof of vaccination to come to worship if it meant not having to register for a seat and not limiting attendance? Does it make any difference to you? Do you have concerns about this change?

Please let us know emailing or calling the office, Pastor Eric or Student Pastor Elina by December 10th so that the council can consider your input in their next meeting. Your voice matters. Thank you for your co-operation.

Vision Process – Step 3



VISIONING PROCESS UPDATE

The next step will happen on Tuesday December 7 at 7 pm. We are going to get a little creative. It can be a picture you have taken or just a general picture from wherever, or any kin of object. As long as it expresses something of the meaning of the value that's fine. Or if you are stumped and can't find a picture or an object please know that you are still invited. We will have conversation around what others have brought to show.

This may seem like a slow process - because it is. Instead of making quick decisions, we want to take the time to listen to God and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit. We trust that God has a purpose for Good Shepherd, a reason why we are here, in this neighbourhood, and we want to understand that purpose in order to make good, faithful decisions about our future mission and ministry.

Thank you for your ongoing interest in this conversation. May the Spirit of God guide us and show us the path.

Property Matters

The drainage grates and sump pumps tanks have been cleaned in anticipation of the arrival of our rainy weather. Pine needles are swept away daily to keep them from being swept again into the drainage areas. This preventative work has proven to be effective in holding off area flooding. Please pray it will continue to be effective to move the water away from the church building in these instances of rain rivers.

In mid-October, when the cold weather arrived, we realized that there was no heat being directed to the daycare and out-of-school care lease areas operating in the church basement. Replacement parts for two of our three furnaces were ordered and installed, and all three of our energy-efficient furnaces are now operating at peak performance levels, thanks to Jim from Chimo Furnaces. Snow removal contracts have been finalized to keep the parking lot plowed and the sidewalks along Sprice Avenue cleared and salted, just in time for the approaching cold weather.

The Property Team discovered a long-standing leak in the men's washroom in the stairwell. The leak has been fixed, the wet concrete has been dried, and remediation is taking place.

The financial donation that was made to the church to upgrade the existing dishwasher has been returned. While it was initially thought this would be an easy swap upgrade, it now appears it will require a larger than anticipated renovation. While not insurmountable, this none-the-less complicates and slows down what was thought to be a relatively straight forward initiative. It will be added to the roster of future upgrades to be considered for the church, and handled accordingly.

Thank you to the Bob and Judy Derksen who generously donated a five dozen cedar boards to the church. This wood has come in very handy to do repairs on a fence and for a youth project

Endings and Beginnings

This time of the year is a strange combination of endings and beginnings. One church year has just come to an end, Advent season is here, and the new year for the church. Soon we will once again celebrate the arrival of God in the human history, and a beginning of a new relationship between God and God's people. And soon after that it will be another end of the year, and another new year 2022...

Advent, in a way, is a time in-between, a liminal time (we've been using that word a lot lately). A new church year has begun, while the old calendar year is winding down towards the end. Our readings on Sundays talk about beginnings and endings as well – we hear warnings of the return of the Son of Man and predictions of the coming Messiah, and we join Mary's joy in her expectation.

Christmas season can sometimes be challenging, especially if there are things in our lives that have recently ended. A divorce, a death, or another loss can make the joy of the season heavy to bear. Grief and lament don't seem to fit the world full of Christmas carols and sparkling decorations. This year, with the ongoing pandemic, the recoveries of Indigenous children, as well as the devastating weather we've had since last summer, there needs to be room for grief. On Tuesday, December 21st, Winter Solstice, there will be an opportunity to gather for a time of silence and lament. Please stay tuned for details.

January will bring us a New Year, and the season of Epiphany – a journey into new things and new possibilities. Please continue to pray for our visioning process, that a new path would emerge during the coming year, and the community Good Shepherd would be able to hear the call of our Shepherd clearly.

Invisible

In an ideal world we would like to see a future where people in our community have access to safe, secure and appropriate housing. We see real people on the street, who for whatever reason are homeless. But do we really "see" them? This problem is increasing, so we tend to think of it as part of our landscape. (perhaps even unsolvable) The homeless become almost invisible. No one sets out to become homeless. We know that we need to, and should care for the poorest and most vulnerable. We want to help, but perhaps don't know what to do, where to look, and perhaps we don't know what is going on in the TriCities regarding services.

Did you know that there is a group called the **TriCities Homelessness and Housing Task Group**? It represents Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam and Port Moody. Members are non-profit and government agencies, businesses, community groups and citizens. They identify, advocate and coordinate actions necessary to address homelessness in the TriCities. Good Shepherd Lutheran Church is one of the many members, and our own Val Newton from GSLC is our representative. She attends these meetings and reports back to the Pastor and to the Outreach Team so that we might discern how we as a congregation might be able to help. Take a few minutes and scroll through the TriCities Homelessness and Housing Task Group website (click here) and you will see their goals, accomplishments and some useful links.

Some examples are: a) Hope for Freedom have Outreach workers who seek out homeless/those at risk to establish rapport and to connect them to resources/services. b) Shelter- 3030 Gordon in Coquitlam has 30 emergency shelter beds and 30 transitional, self-contained housing units to prepare individuals for independent living. 3030 is usually always at capacity and the Task Group continues to explore every option for extreme weather response/emergency shelter. c) Food and Meals- There is SHARE Family and Community Services which provides food hampers for families living in the TriCities. SHARE also provides other services such as counseling. There are the Food Banks. (in Port Moody on Clarke St., in Port Coquitlam at Trinity United Church and in Coquitlam at Hillside Community Church on Austin Ave.) Hamper distributions are on Wednesdays and people should register. d) Phoenix Society which is a non-profit drug and alcohol recovery and education organization. Homelessness is inextricably tied into addiction and mental illness. Phoenix tries to develop partnerships and tries to offer meaningful, sustainable solutions. An Emergency Response Shelter was opened- a Coquitlam hotel was refurbished to support the homeless, and recently established was the Phoenix Flame Food Truck serving the TriCities. It is free to registered users of the Food Bank run by SHARE.

As a <u>congregation</u>, GSLC continues to generously "step up" with clothing, food and monetary donations. Many people are 'hands on' volunteers (although due to Covid many agencies have temporarily suspended volunteering and donations). GSLC, with your help, supports the above-mentioned SHARE, Food Bank, 3030 Gordon and the Phoenix Society, along with several other agencies. As <u>individuals</u>, you can write letters or speak to elected officials, councillors, your MLA and Federal MP's regarding the need for more affordable housing for low-income households and individuals. Continue to make connections in the community. <u>Everyone</u> has a story, so if you see someone experiencing homelessness or loneliness, say hello, smile, have a little chat, listen, or offer to buy a coffee or a sandwich. Really **see** them. Start a dialogue with friends or family regarding the issue of homelessness and what you have learned. If you know of someone who needs help, call 3030 Gordon Shelter at 604.474.0435. Read the *Street Survival Guide* which is on the TriCities website. There is a copy on the church bulletin board and one in the office. If you want more information, there are films to watch. Navigate the website. They are listed on the website under 'I Want to Learn More About Homelessness'.

No one is meant to go through life alone. What is most important is where God comes in, always by your side. Then comes YOU. Life has given us blessings, and bringing God's love into the community is a powerful act. This is being Church. "This is my commandment: love each other just as I have loved you."

Without God's gift to forgive and heal.


You may feel as if you are slipping,


