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Listening to the Voice of Creation

Does it seem like each new week these days is filled with the news of one climate disaster happening somewhere and the warning of another to come? As I write this, heartbreaking reports continue to pour out of Pakistan where historic monsoon

flooding has inundated the country in catastrophic misery: nearly half a million homeless, fathers and mothers with nothing to feed their kids, epidemics of water-born diseases looming. And all this in a country that contributes no more than 1% of global emissions. Talk about climate injustice.

And then came the warning. That Greenland's rapidly melting ice sheet will eventually raise global sea level by at least 10.5 inches - more than twice as much as previously forecast. And this regardless of what measures we take to address global warming.

So why mention this all in a church newsletter when it's around us so much in the news we hear everyday? Because as Christians we should be the ones speaking out the loudest in defense of our planet. We worship a God who created everything that exists and called it good. A God who gave us responsibility for its care. A God who so loves the whole world ("cosmos" in Greek) that he sent his son to save us that we might work to save it.

Enter the Season of Creation, the newest season of the church year which runs from Sept. 1 to October 2, incorporating the 5 Sunday in between. Sure we pray for creation every Sunday. But the Season of Creation calls on us, this year, to listen.

To listen to what our scriptures have to say about our relationship with creation and our call to care for it. To listen closely to the lyrics of the hymns we will sing in church through these weeks and the liturgical texts we've chosen and to let them unsettle us, inspire us, and make us think. To listen to the voices of those across the church challenging our discipleship as Christians through the pages of the Canada Lutheran or some of the links in the "Creation Care" section of our weekly bulletin or by joining a Laudato Si circle (see article on page 11)

Or finally, just listening to creation itself. And I don't just mean birds singing in the morning or waves lapping on a beach. Yes those are beautiful voices. But our planet is also raising its voice in anger, and pain, and protest at what we as a species have so selfishly been doing to the rest of our created siblings. Maybe once we hear those voices we will be ready to speak as we should and we must. If this world is to remain as good as God created it to be in the beginning.






Food for the Food Bank

Throughout the summer months, the Property Team has been heavily involved with exterior property maintenance. The entire property (both our lawn and our trees) have needed regular heavy watering during these dry, heat-dome days. This has been done on a rotational basis, so once a week each section has received a good watering. Thank you Property Team for doing this work, as our trees do not look stressed, so they are thanking you too!

After our Tree Wrapping Party, the City of Coquitlam donated 4 Vine Maple Trees to us, which have all be transplanted to their final resting places on the west side of the parking lot outside the Fellowship Hall area.

The fridge and freezer in the church's kitchen has begun to malfunction, and each time the Property Team has been able to resuscitate it back to life — but only temporarily. A repairman replaced the thermostat as the most probably way to extend its life. It seems to have worked, but only time will tell. A wasp nest was reported in one of the rental properties, and it has been dealt with before anyone — including the daycare children - have been stung.


2022 Church Directories

The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to listen and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to pray and protect our common home, the Oikos of God.

The Season "Celebration" begins 1 September, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations.

2022 THEME

This year we will unite around the theme, "Listen to the Voice of Creation."

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many have become familiar with the concept of being muted in conversations. Many voices are muted in public discourse around climate change and the ethics of Earth-keeping. These are voices of those who suffer the impacts of climate change. These are voices of people who hold generational wisdom about how to live gratefully within the limits of the land. These are voices of a diminishing diversity of more-than-human species. It is the voice of the Earth. The 2022 Season of Creation theme raises awareness of our need to listen to the voice of creation.

The Psalmist declares, "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims God's handiwork. Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge their voice is not heard; yet their voice goes out through all the Earth, and their words to the end of the world." (19: 1-4) Creation never ceases to proclaim, but do we listen?

During the Season of Creation, our common prayer and action can help us listen for the voices of those who are silenced. In prayer we lament the individuals, communities, species, and ecosystems who are lost, and those whose livelihoods are threatened by habitat loss and climate change. In prayer we center the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor. Listening to the voice of creation offers members of the Christian family a rich entry point for interfaith and interdisciplinary dialogue and practice. By listening to the voice of all creation, humans from all cultures and sectors of life can be joined in our vocation to care for our common home (oikos).

May this 2022 Season of Creation renew our ecumenical unity! And may this season of prayer and action be a time to Listen to the Voice of Creation, so that our lives in words and deeds proclaim good news for all the Earth!

Prayer and Advocacy: Raise your voice for climate justice through prayer, or by participating or joining an ongoing campaign, such as the movement to divest from fossil fuels. Follow the issues and events leading up to COP27, to be held in Egypt, November 7-18 2022. Consider speaking with your government representatives or negotiators on issues that will protect creation.

As an unstoppable wave, Christians from all over the world will witness to listen and respond together to the cry of creation. And as we care for our common home (oikos) each prayer or initiative raised will be like a drop of water towards a needed ocean of change.

We hope that this Season of Creation renews and unites us by the one Baptism and call to care for our common home.

"I have heard their cry...I know their sufferings...Come, now! I will send you... I will be with you" (Ex. 3:1-12)



The Burning Bush

Listen to the Voice of creation SEASON OF CREATION 2022

The burning bush is the Symbol for the Season of Creation 2022.

We invite you to use the symbol of a burning bush during your events. Today, the prevalence of unnatural fires are a sign of the devastating effects that climate change has on the most vulnerable of our planet. Creation cries out as forests crackle, animals flee, and people are forced to migrate due to the fires of injustice that we have caused. On the contrary, the fire that called to Moses as he tended the flock on Mt. Horeb did not consume or destroy the bush. This flame of the Spirit revealed God's presence. This holy fire affirmed that God heard the cries of all who suffered, and promised to be with us as we followed in faith to our deliverance from injustice. In this Season of Creation, this symbol of God's Spirit calls us to listen to the voice of creation, and faithfully respond through worship, repentance and action. As you celebrate this Season of Creation, light candles, light the Easter fire, adorn a bush in your place of worship or action. And may this symbol remind us to take off our sandals, contemplate our connection to holy ground, listen for the voice of creation, and be filled with hope to quench the fires of injustice with the light of God's healing love that sustains our common home.

A Story of Vancouver

Where the city of Vancouver now sits was once forests of cedar and hemlock with berry bushes and ferns. There were also many creeks and streams filled with trout and salmon. Great swamps and wetlands were home to ducks, geese, frogs, and insects. Then the Europeans came. Over the years forests were cut down, streams and creeks were filled in, swamps were drained, and wetlands were turned into parks, golf courses, cemeteries, and schools. What was once 120 kilometers of fish bearing creeks and streams is now mostly covered by roads and buildings, although some fragments of wetlands and streams still exist.

One of these fragments is in Strathcona Park. The southern part of the park along what is now Malkin Avenue was originally a marshy tidal basin and mud flat at the upper end of False Creek. Badly polluted by the end of WWI this was filled in and served as a garbage dump for a number of years.

In 1985, local residents took action to transform the 3.34 acres of vacant land into the Strathcona Community Garden, which is still community run and now has a long-term lease with the Vancouver Parks Board. About one third has been dedicated as wildlife habitat including a large pond/wetland area. Over time, illegal dumping caused this wetland to lose its ability to hold water and it was unable to sustain its year-round population of frogs.

In 2016 a new vision of a year-round wetland and plant community was started. Strathcona Gardeners, along with the Environmental Youth Alliance, have removed invasive plant species, planted native species and now in 2022 are proceeding with long planned measures to restore the year-round pond. This project will involve a series of rain gardens and swales to connect to a retention pond and will greatly enhance this much valued inner-city green space.


