ECUMENISM MATTERS

When it comes to relating to other Christians, most of us have a comfort zone that doesn't extend much beyond the members of our own congregation. Which is why ecumenism, sadly, is too often low on our radar as disciples.

Ecumenism (a word that derives from a Greek word meaning "the whole inhabited world") is the movement within Christianity that seeks to work for the unity of the whole Christian family and for cooperation between various denominations. It's also something all Christians are called to make part of their walk of faith (see Jesus' prayer for unity in John 17:20-21).

Some of us have been living out that call here at Good Shepherd in several ways. We have worshipped with neighbouring churches on various occasions, we commemorated the 500th anniversary of the Reformation together, and we've joined in learning events together. And yet, I wonder how deep our commitment goes. Do we see ecumenism as a vital part of our discipleship?

In this newsletter you will read about two upcoming ecumenical opportunities that I am excited about. The first is another service coming up on Reformation Sunday, October 30 with our Roman Catholic friends. Again, we'll worship, converse, and (of course) eat and socialize together. But this won't just be an exercise in "playing nice." It will be a chance to deepen our own faith through encounter with others.

The second is something called a Laudato Si circle. "Laudato Si" is the Latin name of a very influential encyclical written by Pope Francis in 2015 on the subject of caring for creation. And since then groups have sprouted up committed to studying the document and discerning ways to live out its calls to action. There is such a circle that meets at St. Joseph Parish in Port Moody on the 2nd Wednesday of each month. And on October 12 the group is viewing a new film that has been produced based on Pope Francis's encyclical. All are welcome.

This circle for me is a sign of living and breathing ecumenism. What more important work can there be than for Christians to come together and pool resources and wisdom to address one of the biggest existential crises of our time, and follow our Lord into the suffering of the world with the light of the gospel.

To me, ecumenism matters. Maybe joining me in partaking in these two opportunities will help you come to the same conclusion.

Property Matters

On Monday, September 5th, on the Labour Day holiday the property committee (and Dawn) spent 3 hours trimming back our forsythia bushes along Sprice Avenue, raking/sweeping up and loading over 220 lbs of green waste debris into Jerry's trailer, and then disposing it at the green waste recycling area. Take a look at the 'Before" and "After" photos below. Thank you Property Team!



They have also continued to regularly water our trees, shrubs, plants, and grounds, and thanks to Greg Seidel who lent a hand repairing the blade component on the lawn mower, the grass again can be cut when it gets long. Fence repairs have been completed on the old parsonage, and wasp removal was performed at both rental houses, the worst infestation requiring the use of a professional exterminator.


In the kitchen, both the temperature gauge and the control board have been replaced in the old fridge which seems to have sorted out and resolved the leaking issues. A kitchen redesign may be in the future depending on issues that may become apparent when we consider replacing the existing dishwasher. All kitchen users will have a chance to weigh in on future kitchen changes before they are made. Stay tuned here for more information.

At the Special Congregational Meeting which took place on September 25th, a motion was approved to repave the parking lot this fall, at a price not to exceed what we currently have available in our Project Contingency Fund. Three quotes were received for this work, and when looking at the details, Cewe came to the top with the lowest price and the thickest asphalt (2.95"). While all three quotes that were received said they would grind up the existing asphalt, Cewe were the only ones who will grind up the old asphalt on our site and use the grindings under the new asphalt.

The Property Team hopes to deal with what is causing the subsidence/settling in various areas of the parking lot and rectify that problem. However, careful consideration will be given to both the cost and amount of excavation and new gravel fill required, which will also impact what the Property Team ultimately decide to do. The intention is to remove the old problems while staying within our budget. The Property Team will be cutting through the existing asphalt this Thursday doing some trenching should the church decide to go ahead and put in water lines for a possible sprinkling system in the future. Line painting will follow, but timing is uncertain and will likely require waiting until warmer weather in the spring.







Adult Educational Opportunities

Our church will once again be offering classes through the Lay Academy in the fall.

These are online courses from our Leading In Faith Today (LIFT) curriculum. Through LIFT, 21 courses are available for a small cost, which include a video component where course material is presented by faculty members of the Lutheran Theological Seminary (LTS) and printed manuals for reflective thought and discussion. These classes will be facilitated by Pastor Eric, and are typically short course spans. If cost is an issue, let Pastor Eric know as bursaries are available.

Last fall, Student Pastor Elina led those who were interested in two Theological courses offered through the Lay Academy, the feedback from both being very positive.



You are invited to peruse all the courses offered this fall by clicking <u>here</u>, and let Pastor Eric know if you have an interest in exploring any of their course offerings further. So far, 4 potential courses have been identified for use this fall: The Story of the Old Testament; The Story of the New Testament; Lutheran Theology: The Small Catechism; Lutheran Theology: The Augsburg Confession.

Please examine all available options, and if you have one that you would like to explore further please let Pastor Eric know of your interest.

Since then, Laudato Si groups have sprouted up committed to studying the document and discerning ways to live out its calls to action.

St. Joseph's Parish in Port Moody's Laudato Si Circle meets every 2nd Wednesday of the month in the portable on their property (140 Moody Street). See the poster on the next page (page 10). The Exciting news: to mark the end of Care of Creation month a new film will be released on YouTube featuring Pope Francis and the Laudato Si' encyclical. The film is called simply "The Letter". This film will be shown at the next Laudato Si' Circle meeting, Wednesday, October 12th from 7:30pm-9:00pm. Note that this next meeting will be in the church itself, instead of in the portable. (See poster on page 11 advertising for this event.) All are welcome to come and check out this ecumenical movement to care for God's creation.





Most days begin with an (optional) hour of spiritual practice time. Each day, retreatants meet one-on-one with their spiritual director. Each evening concludes with vespers – a contemplative practice to deepen the spiritual life.



Between scheduled sessions, each retreatant practices deep discernment about how their day will be spent. We practice a sabbath time of stepping away from our usual busyness, compulsivity and productivity in order to see clearly, hear deeply, and reconnect with the true self, the Holy, and nature. We seek a different pace.

Circular Economy

The National Waste Reduction Week is being expanded this year into Canada's first Circular Economy Month for October. Week three will be devoted to waste reduction while the other three weeks will explore the ideas of a circular economy.

In a circular economy, nothing is wasted. It retains and recovers as much value as possible from resources by reusing, repairing, refurbishing, and remanufacturing, or recycling. In order to do this, companies need to design out waste and pollution, keep products and materials in use, and regenerate resources. To help make a "closed – loop" system, companies must be responsible for the end-of -life of their products. Products must be better designed for recovering materials that can be fed back into the beginning of production cycles.

There are now more companies around the world trying to follow this cycle such as cleaning and separating worn out artificial turf into its separate components and remaking it into new turf. This is also being done by a nylon carpet company for their product.

Dell Computers is taking back used computers, refurbishing, and repairing if possible or recycling components into new computers.

These are just a couple of examples. Our job as consumers is to be aware of these companies and support the efforts they are making for our Earth.


