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THE SYNOD IS US

Some of you may know that at the last convention of our BC Synod on October of last year I was elected chair of our BC Synod council. That's the body of 12 clergy and lay people from across our synod that govern the synod between conventions, just like a church council governs a congregation between annual meetings.

The synod is one of the three levels or "expressions" of our Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC), the other two being the local congregation (of course) and the national church. Each expression deals with different aspects of our ministry as a church as they are positioned to do so.

That said, most lay members of our church may not be all that familiar with the work of our synod. Perhaps we only hear about it during the report of our treasurer at an AGM, like the one we just held. But the work of the synod has always been important to our life as a congregation whether we realize it or not. There are things that the synod **has always done**, such as supporting our seminary in Saskatoon and recruiting students for its programs (as well as turning out such wonderful interns as Elina Singh).

Then there's the work that the synod **has done from time to time**, such as facilitating the Missional Renewal Process and providing ongoing education and encouragement through learning days at synod conventions and initiatives like the upcoming "Discerning the Way Forward" initiative (stay tuned for details!).

But then there's the work that the synod **has done recently**. And by that I mean since the start of the pandemic. Almost immediately upon the announcement of restrictions our synod instituted a series of gatherings for clergy and lay people to share struggles, questions, and resources to help navigate those anxious times. Those gatherings still continue to this day and provide a wonderful network of support that never existed before. Not only that, but over the course of the pandemic the synod provided every congregation in the synod a gift of \$10,000 to help them through the restrictions...not only once, but twice!

And that really only scratches the surface of all the synod is doing for congregations. I will endeavour to keep you informed of its future activities. But because of the synod we have never been as connected a community of congregations as we are these days. More than ever we are aware that the synod is not some faceless entity that exists apart from the activity of the congregation. The synod is us...all of us at work for the Reign of God.

Next Steps in our Missional Journey

As part of our synod's commitment to help congregations continue the journey of missional renewal, they are offering a new initiative entitled "Discerning the Way Forward". It will consist of a series of eight 90-minute seminars led by Dr. Rev. Susan Beaumont, that will focus on deepening the practice of discernment as a way of listening to God's direction for the future. An orientation to this initiative was held on January 19th. We have a recording of the session (which is about an hour long). Pastor Eric would like to invite anyone who is interested in viewing it to join him on February 15th over Zoom at 7 pm. We'll view the video and have some brief discussion about it afterwards.



We had budgeted to finish out 2022 in the modest deficit position of -\$1,434.00, but thanks to everyone's generosity we actually finished our fiscal year end in the black, in a positive \$4,697.09 position. What an unexpected blessing!

Property Matters

The colder weather has meant the Property Team has mainly been busy with outside maintenance. Specifically, their focus has been with keeping the drains clear to avoid flooding issues, the fallen branches raked and transported to the green waste recycling centre in a timely manner, and ensuring the safety of the sidewalks and new parking lot surface by keeping them shoveled, plowed and salted as needed. Warm spring weather will be required before parking stall lines can be painted on the new parking surface.

Door repairs to an exterior basement door, together with resetting of hinges was completed, and repair work was also completed on the daycare fence which had been damaged by a large fallen branch.

Finally, the Property Team oversaw the work of *Raybern Erectors* in its installation of a partial chain link fence around the small house at the end of January. Stay tuned for news of an opportunity to participate in a Spring Clean-up sometime in the near future.

SANCTUARY Mental Health Ministries

The Sanctuary Course

How can a church become a sanctuary—a place where individuals living with mental health challenges feel safe, supported, and a sense of belonging? *The Sanctuary Course* was created to inspire and equip communities of faith that are asking this important question. Developed in consultation with mental health professionals, theologians, and people with lived experience, this eight-session study

guide explores key mental health topics and examines meaningful ways to offer companionship, support recovery, and promote wellbeing.

Who is it for? *The Sanctuary Course* is a study guide for small groups, designed to raise awareness and start conversations in local churches regarding mental health. Your group might include:

- People with questions about mental health
- Mental health professionals with a wealth of knowledge to share
- Leaders who want to engage their community in mental health conversations
- People supporting loved ones with mental health problems
- People living with mental health problems

The Sanctuary Course is for anyone who wants to learn about faith and mental health. It requires no previous training or expertise—just a willingness to engage in dialogue with other believers. This course and films address difficult and sensitive topics, and may not be appropriate for a young audience. It is not recommended for people ages 17 and younger.







Single Use Plastic Ban

As of December 20, 2022, the manufacture and import for sale in Canada of six categories of single use plastics will be banned. These were specifically selected because they are commonly found in the environment, are harmful to wildlife and their habitats, are difficult to recycle with some containing problematic plastics, and have readily available alternatives.

Problematic plastics are those that contain expanded polystyrene foam, extruded polystyrene foam, polyvinyl chloride, carbon black or oxo-degradable plastic.

These bans take place in stages in order to provide businesses in Canada to transition, and to deplete their existing stock.

- Sales of check out bags, cutlery, food service ware, stir sticks and straws will be totally banned on December 20, 2023. (Some single use flexible straws are excluded under certain conditions.)
- Ring carriers and flexible straws packaged with beverage containers will be totally banned on June 20, 2024.
- Manufacture, import, and sale for export will be banned on December 20, 2025.

These regulations do not apply to plastic manufactured items that are waste or that are transiting through Canada.

Will this make much of a difference in Canada's plastic waste? Based on data from 2019, *Greenpeace Canada* estimates that these bans will result in 5% less consumer plastic waste, while the federal government's estimation is less optimistic, assessing that these bans will result in 3% less consumer plastic waste.

Although both of these estimations show a very small percentage benefit when considering the tons of plastic waste produced annually in Canada, it remains a very important first step, and we as consumers need to continue to keep pushing our governments and our Canadian businesses to stay the course and continue to find ways to reduce single use plastics along with better recycling options.


Did you also know that God also wants us to be kind to animals? Proverbs 12:10 states "A righteous man cares for the needs of his animal."
