TRAVELERS AND TOURISTS

I've lived long enough to know that summer isn't really all that less busy than any other season. It's just busy in a different way. And that seems to hold true both for kids and adults these days.

But still I hope you find some time to get away and step out of your usual routine this summer. Maybe that's to a cabin at a favourite lake. Or maybe it's just a staycation in your own backyard. Or maybe you have plans to travel and be a tourist in some unexplored destination.

One of my favourite Lutheran preachers is Peter Marty. He talks about the difference between tourists and travelers. He writes, "The word *Travel* comes from the same word as *travail*, meaning trouble, work, or even torment. A traveler takes risks, plunges into diverse cultures, and seeks to learn local customs. Unplanned experiences are the traveler's norm, sometimes involving challenging exploits. Travelers eat whatever food is placed before them. They aim to learn as much of the language as possible. Shopping for souvenirs plays no role in their ventures."

"A tourist sacrifices less. The word *tour*, from the Latin *tornus*—a tool for making circles—literally means "one who goes in circles." A tourist is a pleasure seeker who passes through different exotic experiences only to return to a comfortable bed at night. Insulated from the noise, the smells, and the local people, a tourist's circle is complete once back home unpacking mementos and sharing photos."

I've been both a traveler and a tourist and each has their pros and cons. But Marty goes on to wonder whether those terms can be applied to our faith journey as well. He continues, "Travelers would be those who come (to church) to immerse their lives and refocus their values. They want to breathe the language of faith and know the way of Christ, even if travail may be part of the bargain. The tourists show up for a more passive experience, happy to drop in when they are in the mood. They spectate and consume, glad that the donuts taste fresh."

However you find your physical R&R this year it might be fruitful for all of us to reflect on how we are journeying spiritually on the road of faith these days. If you tend to be more of a tourist, taking a safer approach to faith, maybe it's time to challenge ourselves to be more of a traveler, risking a journey rich in mystery, and new experience. What might that look like for you? Reading a book you might not otherwise? Praying in a different way? Talking to a trusted friend about faith like you never have before? Your adventure awaits!





Next time, it may be another encounter, just a smile maybe, with someone who hasn't seen one in a while. Maybe it will just be a cheery welcome said to a stranger who hasn't heard that in a while. God calls each of his own to Himself. We all are only responsible for welcoming his children and nurturing them when we are able as they come alongside each of our journeys.

Christian hospitality is something we at Good Shepherd know about. It is in our blood. In fact it is one of the core values that we identified as being important to us when we were doing our Visioning exercise last year. These random connections with our neighbours may seem only random, even "un-special" on the surface to some. But to us, they are ministry. They are connection. They are the possibility of a holy moment.

And they have such potential to become tangible blessings from God to both parties, too. We in the church just need to have an open mind and an open heart to a new adventure that we're being called to. And know deeply that God walks with us, too. And that, my friends, makes us brave, too.

Service of Confession and Reconciliation to Apologize to Rev. William (Bill) Fehr

On Saturday, May 20, 2023, Hope Lutheran Church, Nanaimo hosted a special in-person and on-line service of confession and reconciliation, to publicly apologize to Rev. William (Bill) Fehr, and his family and friends.

Over 33 years ago, Rev. Fehr was serving as a pastor, when our church decided that it was inappropriate for gay persons to serve as ordained clergy. As Pastor Bill says, "Our integrity was called into question. A small group of us spoke at length about our futures and our concerns and had to make very personal decisions. One of my friends told his congregation and was immediately fired. I chose to resign. Another chose silence. Whatever we chose there have been years of pain and loss for all of us and for those in the church who felt they were no longer welcome."

Pastor Terry Richardson and the people of Hope Lutheran, Nanaimo hosted the special service that was based in part on a rite created by and for Ralph Carl Wuschke (that was dedicated to those who died without seeing the promise). Retired National Bishop Raymond Schultz preached, Bishop Jason Zinko (MNO Synod) and Bishop Kathy offered Pastor Bill and his family and friends public apologies, and Pastor Bill Fehr, now reinstated to the roster, presided at Holy Communion. Statement from the Rev. Dr. William Harrison, President, LTS:

"As President of LTS, I am pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Kyle Schiefelbein-Guerrero as Grace Professor of Leadership. Dr. Schiefelbein-Guerrero brings an abiding interest in issues of leadership and an impressive history of teaching in Lutheran schools in the USA, where he is an active member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Dr. Schiefelbein-Guerrero has a strong history of publication in several fields: liturgy, digital education and church, and leadership. He led a workshop in our 2022 summer conference on Religious Community in a Digital World. He recently edited a book titled, Church After the Corona Pandemic: Consequences for Worship and Theology, and serves as co-editor of the academic journal, Teaching Religion & Theology. We



believe that Dr. Schiefelbein-Guerrero will provide important direction as the Professor of Leadership role takes shape, incorporating theological reflection on the nature of leadership in the changing church as part of the seminary's life and imparting necessary practical skills to our students."

Some hope for the summer

With all the problems happening around the world right now, it is sometimes hard to see the hopeful gains being made. Here are a few things happening in 2023.

Land protection is increasing.

- A new conservancy in the Incoppaleux Valley in B.C. will protect 58,000 hectares of an endangered rainforest, preventing logging, mining, and hydroelectric development.
- 460 acres in Somerset England set aside for a Nature Reserve will be a blueprint for major recovery sites in all 48 counties in England by 2050, covering almost 25,000 acres.

Solar panel use is expanding in many parts of the world.

- Heritage buildings including York Minster Church, Pompeii, and the Vatican are discreetly making solar power.
- In Lebanon, a commercial baker's ovens are powered by solar panels, reducing the use of diesel fuel by 80%.
- Small solar panels are being used in villages where there is no electricity, to power small things such as electric lights, small grain grinders, cell phones, and even small cooking stoves.
- The use of EVs and heat pumps is growing, reducing fossil fuel use, while at the same time, new technologies are developing ways to recycle nickel, cobalt, and lithium from car batteries, and silicon from obsolete solar panels.

Countries are working together on projects.

- An internationally funded water treatment plant is being built which will allow cleaner water to flow into Wadi Gaza's fragile environment, helping to restore vegetation.
- Over 100 countries now have a full or partial ban on single use plastics.

There are many more hopeful projects happening around the world, but here are a few to pack into your suitcase for the summer.


