INCLUSIVE ON PURPOSE



Intentional Inclusivity

We value people in all their uniqueness and diversity, as God does, and welcome friendship with everyone we encounter even when that challenges our comfort

In case you've lost the thread, I've been using these articles all year to reflect on our proposed Guiding Principles (which you can read on the next page). We will be discussing these revised principles at our next Missional Munch on Sunday, January 18. I hope you'll join us.

So far I've written about "Radical Lutheran Identity", "Discipling Worship", "Missional Stewardship", and "Joyful Fellowship". This time I'd like to touch on "Intentional Inclusivity".

There's maybe no cycle of seasons in the church year that emphasizes inclusivity more than the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle we are in right now. Isaiah gives us an Advent vision of a restored Jerusalem in which "all nations shall stream to it" (Isaiah 2:2). In Luke's Christmas gospel even marginalized shepherds are invited to the manger. And in Epiphany foreign adherents of another faith are gathered into the celebration. It's as if God is very intentionally saying absolutely everyone is welcome into the embrace of this good news.

It's in response to that witness that we are discerning God's call to be intentional about our inclusivity as a congregation too. We love to sing "All Are Welcome". But we can't do so honestly if we don't mean **"ALL** are welcome." That means firstly becoming aware of which people are missing from our congregational family. And secondly, it means not leaving welcoming up to chance, but purposefully extending friendship to everyone who steps through our door.

One example of intentional inclusivity is a process called "Reconciling in Christ" which a number of our sister congregations in BC synod have adopted. Basically, it educates congregations on what it means to be publicly welcoming of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. Congregations are guided through the process of developing a welcome statement for their church that openly communicates its acceptance and welcome of LGBTQ2SIA+ persons.

Intentional inclusivity can be uncomfortable. It certainly was for certain characters in those scriptures I mentioned above. But when we are helped, in a compassionate and sensitive way, to stretch our understanding of inclusivity, we can experience the joy of being God's family on its deepest level. And also the greatest gift of Christmas: that in Jesus, "what has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of **all** people." (John 1:3-4).

Listening to God and to each other, we commit to live out our life and ministry as Good Shepherd Lutheran Church guided by the following principles:



Radical Lutheran Identity

Fearless Caring




We love all people - those like us and unlike us - even when that is risky, inconvenient, uncomfortable, or makes us vulnerable.








The book club will be taking a break during the month of December and will not be meeting.





During my Budapest Math Semester, I stayed with Jewish families and heard their survival stories. Then I went to graduate school at the University of Pennsylvania where many Jewish professors would not teach on Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur, but would on Good Friday. Surely, I was the foremost Taiwanese-Canadian Jewish sympathizer!


Then, a few years ago, our church book club read *I Shall Not Hate: A Gaza Doctor's Journey on the Road to Peace and Human Dignity*. To learn about the enduring conflict, during the more recent war on Gaza, I finished *The Hundred Years' War on Palestine*.

Now I am just sad for everyone in God's beloved vineyard. Without the devastation of wars, it can be a land flowing with milk and honey. But now so many endure so much unthinkable suffering.

How can we help turn God's vineyard into the cherished garden again?

God of love songs, sing us into becoming lovers of peace and justice. Amen.

Supporting our Partners in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land

The ELCIC National Office and Eastern Synod continue to appeal for support of our global mission and companion synod partners — the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL). In a recent October 10, 2025 statement from the Patriarchs and Heads of Churches in Jerusalem, the leaders “rejoiced at the recent enactment of the ceasefire in Gaza, and the release of those held captive.”

At the same time, they also acknowledged their shared concern regarding, “increasing violence against local communities in the West Bank in connection with settlement expansions.” The leaders urged the international community as a whole, “to widen the scope of the current negotiations to include an end of the occupation of both the West Bank and Gaza, leading to the establishment of a Palestinian state living side-by-side in peace with the present State of Israel.”

The war between Israel and Hamas has greatly affected our partners in the ELCJHL. Most of them have relatives in Gaza. Restricted movement in the region has continued to impact people’s ability to work and move freely, resulting in huge financial implications for the church.

Our church’s long-standing relationship with the ELCJHL is a vital expression of our shared faith and commitment to justice and peace. You are invited to: pray for peace, learn more about the work of the ELCJHL and give generously to the ELCJHL Appeal.





These gifts required no wrapping nor were terribly costly, but they have given us so much pleasure this year. We've had a three way text stream, including pictures, from the first peek of the new growth of spring bulbs, then flowers, then edibles.

We've shared;

Triumphs – Brigitte's huge kale plant, our abundance of strawberries, Barbara's first tomato.

Wild life – A flicker in Brigitte's garden, the ground-bee colony in our backyard, and Barbara's deer nipping off the top of a green onion then spitting it out in disgust moving on to the next green onion – repeat, repeat, repeat...





Wednesday afternoon Prayer Gathering at 1:30 pm over Zoom


